Refueling Squadron breaks a "record"

At 9 p.m., last Saturday night, ILt. James (Percy) Longtine, of Sawyer's 46th Air Refueling Squadron, jumped from his seat with a screech. He had broken one of Sawyer's most important, least publicized, trivia records.

He had remained seated, in the same chair, for 31 consecutive hours while on alert duty. This broke the previous record, held by Capt Carl Schoen, by one hour.

When interviewed, Percy, er,., Lieutenant Longtine had just begun his quest for the title, and Capt. Steve Coleman was taking his blood pressure. When asked if the base medical authorities had recommended monitoring Longtine's vital signs, Coleman said he really didn't know, because when he called the hospital to check all he got from the other end was laughter. They all decided to be safe and attempt to monitor on an hourly basis. By the way, Longtine's blood pressure jumped to 150 over 100 when he saw the photographer, so he was alive.

Lieutenant Longtine said, "Life isn't all excitement for a Sawyer 'Crew Dog' (a term fondly used by alert crew members when referring to themselves). I've been in training for this for two alert tours."

There were breaks for Longtine, he could leave his chair for five minutes each hour. He said this would be especially handy in case of natural emergencies.

Longtine was so excited by the prospects of holding a record, I wished then I had brought one along. You could tell he was excited by the way he was throwing names around, saying, "Col Heinrich (the wing deputy commander for operations) almost stopped by to wish me luck."

The contestant really had a lot of "support", he said, "The other 'Crew Dogs' are really behind me. They bring me my meals, and this really is a group effort"

At the end of his ordeal, a relieved Lieutenant Longtine said, "Well, it was a hard fought battle. I did get a little sore in places, but when it was over all I wanted to do was relax; so I just got another cup of coffee and sat down to watch some more television."

The 46th isn't finished yet; there is a report that another "Crew Dog" is going to attempt 120 hours in bed. Maybe he can begin that one around he 25th of December with, "Merry Christmas to all, and to all, a goodnight."

Longtine is right, life isn't all ex-citement for a "Crew Dog".

46th AREFS wins Evans trophy

The 46th Air Refueling Squadron's Boom Operator Section was recently awarded the SMSgt. Albert L, Evans Memorial Trophy for being named the best boom operator section in the Strategic Air Command for 1981.

The trophy is named after SMSgt. Albert L. Evans, who was fatally injured in a KC-135 accident at Castle AFB, Calif. Sergeant Evans was stationed at Sawyer in the early seventies, where he served as a boom operator instructor for the 46 AREFS.

The 410th Bombardment Wing Commander mentioned in a written endorsement that the 46th AREFS, "through its diverse experience, professional competence, and sustained super performance in worldwide air refueling operations, amassed an unparalled service record for 1981." A committee at Headquarters SAC agreed, and determined that the 46th AREFS had the best record for 1981.

During 1981, the 46th AREFS logged 4401.8 flying hours during 1109 sorties. Along the way, boom opera-

Ernst Wilhelm Krubsack 12-8-12 tors refueled 671 non-SAC receivers and 400 SAC bombers, tankers, reconnaissance* and command/control aircraft.

During the September 1981 First Combat Evaluation Group inspection, all boom operators that were tested, earned perfect scores. All in-flight evaluations were also given high marks. Similarly, 24 KC-135 crews from the 46th AREFS were given the highest possible rating for mission effectiveness during the three week Global Shield worldwide readiness exercise in February 1981. And in the March 1981 Operational Readiness Inspection, all 16 crews that flew qualified for 8th Air Force Blue Ribbons.

Crews from the 46th AREFS also participated in the Red Flag Tanker Task Force at March AFB, Calif., during October and November 1981. Sawyer boom operators flew 83 sorties, refueling 600 Tactical Air Command aircraft, offloading 4 million pounds of fuel during the six week exercise. Lt. Col. Jerry Reese, tanker task force coordinator at March said, "The 46 AREFS did the finest job of any refueling squadron we have had to date. They kept a low profile, handled their own problems, and performed in a superbly professional manner."

Commenting on the success of the 46th AREFS this past year, Lt Col. Ronald B, Childers, 46th AREFS commander said, "1 have had the opportunity to pass through a unit with many dedicated professionals. It has been especially gratifying to me to have been the commander of the 46th AREFS during 1981.

Besides recognition for flying and inspection performances, the boom operator section also accomplished activities while on the ground.

Six boom operators completed a Professional Military Education course during 1981. And more than 25 percent of the boom operators received college credits during 1981.

Colonel Childers also mentioned that ail seven first term airmen, as well as all career airmen who came up for reenlistment, did reenlist. Colonel Childers also added that five airmen on base cross trained into the boom operator field in 1981.

Boom operators also helped sponsor Cub Scout Packs 352 and 356, as well as supporting Boy Scout Troop 356. Their help insured a high quality scouting program.

In conclusion, the Wing Commander's endorsement said that "the extraordinary professionalism, a trademark of the 46th AREFS boom operators, coupled with the impressive record of achievements, unequivocally justifies the presentation of the SMSgt. Albert L. Evans Memorial Trophy for 1981 to the 46th AREFS Boom Operator Section," Colonel Childers echoed that thought by saying that "the boom operator section of the 46th AREFS is a true group of dedicated, hard working, mission oriented Individuals, who truly deserve the recognition they received via the SMSgt. Albert L. Evans Memorial Trophy."
